Adventure, interaction and communication are key elements to each piece of Harriet's work. Behind every 'stitch' lies a narrative of people, place and culture.


To power her sewing machine in remote places, Harriet encourages her street audience to pedal a bicycle which generates electricity and powers the art, increasing the interaction between herself and her subject.
